JULY 28, 2020 COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE – SAGINAW COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT FISCAL YEAR 2021 BUDGET DISCUSSIONS

You have set aside the July 28, 2020 Committee of the Whole meeting to conduct a deeper "dive" into the Saginaw County Health Department Fiscal Year 2021 Budget. The Health Department has made an ask for additional General Fund support of \$816,620.

I stated in my June 30, 2020 Fiscal Year Budget Transmittal Letter, "The Saginaw County Health Department has struggled financially to provide programs and services. The County has historically reduced staff as a means of balancing the Health Department budget. I firmly believe we are at a crossroad to determine which services and programs we will continue to provide and the ability to fund those services and programs. (Tab #1,p.2)" I further believe we need to address how to provide sustainable funding for the Health Department. The Budget Audit Committee had a discussion on possibly presenting a millage questions to voters in November as a more reliable funding source. I also believe we need to consider all options in creating or rebuilding a strong, agile Health Department.






