### Words Can Make a Difference for Those in Recovery By: Judge Julie A. Gafkay

On May 22, 2023, during National Treatment Court month, the Saginaw County Drug Treatment Court formally announced it was changing its name after over a decade as the Saginaw County Drug Treatment Court. The new name is the Saginaw County Adult Felony Recovery Treatment Court (AFRTC), or more commonly referred to as Saginaw Recovery Court (SRC). While the change in name may seem insignificant, its focus on recovery, instead of drugs, matters. Words can make the difference for those in recovery. It can be as simple as changing the word "hopeless" to "hopeful".

As a legal community, we can choose to use words in a more positive way to address those in the legal system because of substance use (as opposed to substance abuse). The National Institute on Drug Abuse has published a handout with recommendations on language to use related to substance use. Below are a few examples:

Instead of	Use	Because
Addict, user, substance abuser, drug abuser, junkie, alcoholic, drunk	Person with a substance use disorder, person with an opioid use disorder, person with an alcohol use disorder	Use of person-first language is ideal; person experiences a problem rather than "is" the problem
Former addict, reformed addict	Person in recovery, person who previously used drugs, person not actively using drugs/alcohol	Avoids eliciting negative associations, punitive attitudes, individual blame
Substance abuse Prescription drug abuse	Substance use Drug use other than as prescribed	"abuse" (and to some extent, "misuse") is associated with negative judgements
Clean/dirty	Testing positive/negative for a particular substance (toxicology screening test)	Uses clinically accurate, non-stigmatizing terminology as for other medical conditions

Using the person-first language followed by the person's behavior tells the listener you respect that person regardless of their behavior. For instance, saying, "a person who engaged in injection drug use," instead of saying, "injection user." Showing individuals respect, not just a person experiencing a substance use disorder, can make a big difference in that individual ultimately being receptive and successful.

Referrals to the SRC can be made online at saginawcounty.com. Referrals should be made as soon as possible after a defendant's arrest but can be made anytime during the criminal proceeding before sentencing. Referrals can be made by almost anyone including defense counsel, pretrial services, district and circuit judges, probation officers, and defendants can make a self-referral. Qualifications for SRC include: an adult non-violent offender, residing in Saginaw County, with a high-high or high-medium risk/needs assessment, and a substance use disorder. ### AGENCY HIGHLIGHTS:

- The agency celebrated its 50th Anniversary providing services to the public. Thank you to the taxpayers of Saginaw County for continuing to support the Commission in our mission to meet the needs of older adults in our community.
- Energy Smart Seniors with Consumers Energy Program generated \$250 to \$500 for each senior center to utilize at their center. Participants received a energy saving kit if they signed up for the program.
- Freeland Senior Center re-opened in September 2023. This was the last center to reopen post covid. Staffing availability was the primary reason for the delay. Additionally, the senior center is in the process of applying to the state to the move the senior center to the Freeland Memorial Park Building in early 2023.
- The Board of Commissioners approved \$1,699,837 million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding to support specific projects and lost revenue at the agency. This support will address several critical capital improvements needed at the main office and Marie Davis Senior Center, and support equipment needs at other senior center locations for the operation of the Meals on Wheels and Congregate Dining programming. Bids have been received for Marie Davis and it is anticipated that renovations will start in early 2024. Eleanor Frank is also scheduled for upgraded flooring, paint, tables and chairs in early 2024.
- COA was awarded additional funding under the Older American Act funding for specific programming for FY23 and FY24 which will aid in supporting increased costs of food and fuel for the nutrition program and also allow the agency to expand the Case Coordination and Support program.
- Received project authorization for the Transportation program to expand the fleet for two electric vehicles and all facilities necessary to house electric model vehicles and replace one lift accessible vehicle through the regular rotation.
- 484 Senior Project Fresh Coupons distributed to Saginaw County older adults. Each person received a \$25 coupon book to use on Michigan fruits/vegetables at local farmers markets.
- Kinship Program, in partnership with Region VIII AAA, distributed backpack and school supplies to older adults raising related minors.
- Saginaw County Public Works volunteered their time as a department to package meals on wheels cold bags.
- Addition of two new schools in Bay and two new schools in Midland County for the Foster Grandparent program.

### CHALLENGES:

• Staffing in the nutrition program (specifically Kitchen Assistant's and Meals on Wheels Delivery Driver) continue to be a challenge. The hourly rate is not competitive and has been difficult to recruit/retain. These key positions are necessary to carry out the congregate (senior center) and meals on wheels grants. Maintaining current operations has been a challenge and has required the agency to continue with modified meal delivery/limited menu options.

### **EXTERNAL PARTNERSHIPS:**

### Region VII Area Agency on Aging:

- Hosted four (4) employees through the Senior Community Service Employment Program. Staff assist at the Marie Davis, Friendship and Eleanor Frank Center. There is no local cost (only in-kind for supervision) to support these positions and it greatly assists with agency special projects/programming.
- Medicare Open Enrollment offered office space so Saginaw residents could receive assistance locally instead of driving to Bay County.
- Kinship Care Program backpack giveaway and back to school shopping.

### Saginaw Intermediate School District (ISD):

• This is the fifth year COA has partnered with Saginaw Intermediate School District (ISD)'**s** Work Based Learning program. Students assisted with packaging of home delivered and congregate meals.

### Parkinson's Support Group:

• Partnered with the Parkinson's Support Group to offer space and equipment needed to hold monthly meetings with residents.

### YMCA of Saginaw:

- Senior Healthy Living Expo.
- Added strength and stretch classes at Friendship and Marie Davis.

### WAIT LISTS:

- 1. **IN-HOME SUPPORT SERVICES:** Services include light housekeeping, personal care, and respite care. This program is supported through the Region VII Area Agency on Aging (AAA) with limited funding availability. Our agency contracts with authorized service providers approved by Region VII AAA. A wait list for services was established in January 2018.
  - a. Currently there are 31 clients on the wait list for services. Clients are prioritized by need for service, and priority scale score (which is determined through the assessment process). Currently, there is approximately a one-year wait for individuals on the wait list for Homemaking services.
- 2. **HOME DELIVERED MEALS:** A wait list was established in August 2023 due to several delivery routes operating at capacity for the number of clients that can be put on the route and maintain safe food delivery guidelines. Additional routes can be created if a wait list is maintained in specific areas. Volunteer interest to deliver meals on wheels and ability to staff routes are the current challenges on already established routes.
  - a. Currently, there are 33 individuals on the wait list.
  - b. Of the 47 routes delivered weekly, 14 currently have a wait list.

The Equalization staff has had a very busy year. We were able to complete tax roll printing for 28 of the 30 taxing jurisdictions in Saginaw County for both Summer and Winter seasons; as well as processing and preparing all of the personal property statements and assessment change notices.

The Department has finalized the equalization studies in the various classes of property in Saginaw County. These studies are used to determine the ratios and multipliers to be applied to the various classifications of property in all the cities and townships for the 2024 assessment year. We visited over 1200 parcels this year from all classes. Studies were completed and distributed to the Assessors by December 1st. The State Tax Commission (STC) has determined that a two year sales study be used in the residential class in all cases. Preliminary residential studies were mailed to assessors at the end of September. We are now required to download all studies and reports onto the MEG system for the STC by January 1st.

The State Tax Commission has set a 7.9% inflation rate to be used in calculating the 2024 property tax Headlee millage rollbacks. However, Proposal A limits the increase in taxable value to inflation rate or 5%, whichever is less, until the property is sold. So that means that property owners can expect a 5% increase in taxable values for 2024 but this cannot exceed the 2024 state equalized value.

### Challenges:

### Ongoing:

• Staff was reduced due to Covid-19. Full replacement of staff has yet to occur. A conscious decision has been made to complete all the organizational plans prior to adding staff. The final draft plans have been submitted to the U.S. Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration. These plans will guide the organizational programming in 2024, 2025, 2026 and beyond.

Hotel Occupancy in October was 55.2%, the average daily rate reached \$127. Leisure and hospitality jobs were measured at 12.8K in October, growing 0.8% over last year at the same time. TSA numbers at MBS Airport totaled 10.1K growing 60.3% over the prior year but still down 24% as compared to 2019. Hotel room sales through October reached \$62,309,734 a 3.8% increase over 2022. The census of properties reporting is 39, with 3,040 rooms in their inventory. This represents 77.3 of the properties in Saginaw County.

### MOSQUITO ABATEMENT (HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE) William Stanuszek, Director - <u>stanuszek@scmac.org</u>

The following highlights Mosquito Abatement's 2023 Accomplishments as well as a few goals for the upcoming 2024 season. What started out as a normal control season with over 52,000 acres of woodland habitat treated by plane in the spring, became very dry which limited mosquito nuisance in May and June. A noticeable increase in mosquito biting activity was realized after the 4th of July and peaked in September with the return of consistent large rainfall events. Recall, that the more rain we get the more mosquitoes we will have, as the resultant floodwater habitat hatches out countless mosquitoes. This was also the first season in which control operations continued into October as a result of a warm early fall.

Our 2023 Annual Report offers a full account of this past season and is available on our website, <u>saginawmosquito.com</u>.

2023 Highlights

- Continued community control operations into October due to mild early fall temperatures and mosquito biting activity.
- Expanded larval control using long-lasting control products that target both nuisance and disease-carrying mosquitoes, thus increasing control coverage.

### MOSQUITO ABATEMENT (HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE) William Stanuszek, Director - <u>stanuszek@scmac.org</u>

- Increased public access to treatment notifications and services through our downloadable public notification app and website, where residents can report mosquitoes and request service.
- Started baseline tick surveillance, establishing a process and general accounting of established tick species.
- Started collaborative research initiative with Saginaw Valley State University's Biology Department.
- Collected over 5,000 scrap tires through our Scrap Tire Collection program, which included Saturday tire drives held in St. Charles and Taymouth Townships.
- Scanned and digitized thousands of historical documents related to source reduction projects encompassing over 40 years.

### 2024 Goals

- Continue to plan for and meet challenges of extended control operations into October. Including expansion of seasonal employee pool and creating employee recruitment video.
- Hire field technology coordinator and begin establishment of drones for mosquito control and monitoring.
- Increase collaborative opportunities with Saginaw County Health Department with regard to neglected swimming pools, mosquito-borne disease testing, and tick reporting and monitoring.
- Begin construction of mosquito abatement facility.
- Continue to expand strategies and effectiveness of control operations and services.

Saginaw County Parks and trails continue to be busy with a milder start to winter and we are excited to share the winter programming activities (flyer attached) available in addition to our daily park hours. We also groom our park trails for cross country skiing once a 6" base is established. We hope to see you in the parks this winter for a hike, ski or program!

Saginaw County Parks finalized a Five Year Saginaw County Area Recreation Plan at the November 2023 Saginaw County Board of Commissioners meeting. Partner communities included Bridgeport, Carrollton, Maple Grove, Spaulding, Taymouth, and Zilwaukee Townships. We plan to continue with the joint plan model in the future and welcome additional partner municipalities to join us. Please consider reviewing/aligning your municipality's 5 Year Recreation Plan cycle or joining us to create your first one when we begin the renewal process in 2027/2028. The five year recreation plan is a requirement of recreation acquisition/development grant resource applicants through the Michigan Department of Natural Resources including the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund. Speaking of the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund program, Saginaw County received notification in December of a \$300,000 grant award for rehabilitation projects along the oldest sections of the Saginaw Valley Rail Trail. Funding will be finalized in 2024 with the project likely taking place in late 2024/early 2025.

Planned projects in 2024 include the long-anticipated construction of a trailhead on the south end of the BayZil Trail in Zilwaukee Township and kicking off a large-scale habitat restoration project at Saginaw River Headwaters Rec Area with funding through the Great Lakes Fish and Wildlife Restoration Act. We will also be preparing for continued capital improvements at Imerman Memorial Park in Saginaw Township including a boat launch restoration, addition of a canoe/kayak launch and other accessibility upgrades.

- Tim Ninemire, the Officer of Recipient Rights and Dir of Customer Services and Security, retired on October 31, 2023, after more than 30 years of service to SCCMHA. The scope of Mr. Ninemire's responsibilities has been reorganized, with Kentera Patterson now serving as the Recipient Rights and Compliance Officer, and Melissa Gutzwiller moving with her current responsibilities as Supervisor of Environmental Services, to a Director Position and taking on the additional responsibilities for Customer Services and Security.
- SCCMHA has completed the new security camera project at Hancock and Albert & Woods Buildings. Our antiquated camera system was replaced with a "state of the art" system to support our 24/7 operations where cameras are now programable to record or view only. This new technology supports our operational changes and space renovations over time supporting service expansion.
- 200+ existing cameras are being returned to SCCMHA by the vendor, for repurposing to other smaller SCCMHA facilities as a Phase II Security Camera Plan. The project cost which utilized county bond dollars included:
  - \$168,529 New Camera Equipment
  - 57,000 Kibbe Design and Project Management
  - 37,816 New IT Switches
  - \$263,345 Project Total
- Ryan Mulder was promoted from Executive Assistant to the CEO to the Manager of the CEO Office in October. His job description now reflects all his responsibilities to the CEO, her office, the committees that the CEO chairs and the SCCMHA board. He is also supervising the new Public Relations Specialist, Andrew Fergerson. Mr. Fergerson started in his new position with SCCMHA in November.
- SCCMHA was invited by MDHHS to make a grant application to become an expansion site for an Early Childhood Specialty Court in partnership with the local MDHHS Child Welfare Office, led by Dir. Jennifer Shores and Judge Barbara Meter and Todd Borders of the Family Division of the Saginaw 10th Circuit Court.
- SCCMHA will receive \$106,172 in grant funding from MDHHS to support our hiring of a highly credentialled clinician with Infant Mental Health certification to serve as the Court Coordinator for a new Early Childhood Specialty Court docket. The specialty court docket will provide service to families of young children in the child welfare system through collaboration between child welfare, the family court and SCCMHA specialty clinical practice, to promote child safety, family preservation and permanency. The SCCMHA lead for the project is Erin Nostrandt, Dir. of SCCMHA Children's Services. Development planning for the new specialty court docket will begin in calendar 2024 with our Saginaw Family Court and local MDHHS Child Welfare partners.

Great Lakes Bay Michigan Works! and Michigan Works! One of the most immediate and crucial was getting my car registered in Michigan. You ensured that I had the necessary resources to secure the new tires my vehicle desperately needed. Thanks to your assistance, I could safely commute to and from my new job (a drill operator earning \$1,000 a week at Team Fick Underground), a game-changer for me.

What truly sets Michigan Works apart is the dedication and kindness of staff. They aren't just there to do a job – they genuinely care about the success and well-being of those they serve. Their eagerness to see customers succeed is obvious, and their unwavering support has been a beacon of hope during a challenging time in my life.

Other Success Stories Demonstrate How a Little Help From GLBMW Goes a Long Way Toward Strengthening the Region's Workforce for Employers



Flight school and piloting airplanes are now an attainable goal for Andrew F. Career coaches at GLBMW helped him gain confidence and energize his job search toolkit to land a better job earning \$20 an hour (up from a part-time job paying \$12.50 an hour). Andrew participated in online workshops and worked with his coach to determine his future goals. With the greater financial freedom offered with his new job, Andrew is saving money for school. He has been invited to interview for flight school with Republic Airways.

Danielle B. went from being a financially struggling SVSU nursing student to a full-time intensive care clinician with the help of GLBMW. During the three clinical semesters of her training, she was unable to work enough to support herself, and her career goals were in jeopardy. GLBMW helped with coaching, nursing school tuition for her remaining semesters, and fees related to state testing, background checks, fingerprinting. Upon completion of her bachelor's degree in nursing, Danielle successfully passed her state boards and accepted a job making \$32.55 an hour.

Like many young adults in our region, Aubree C. found herself stuck -- three years post high school -without reliable transportation, job experience, or career direction. GLBMW staff helped Aubree gain job experience working at The Salvation Army and Alma Public Library. She participated in life skill classes, job seeker workshops, talent tours, and career exploration activities. She discovered she loves helping people.

Now working full-time as a home health care worker at Bay Human Services, Aubree earns \$16.85 an hour. "Michigan Works! provided me with bus passes that helped me get to work, along with opportunities to explore different careers, gain work experience, and learn new skills that I can use at work and in everyday life," she notes. "One of the lessons I learned is to keep working hard toward my goals, even if something doesn't work out how I planned.

As a single mother with a teenage son, Terria S. was having difficulty finding a job that would allow her to be at home during the daytime to monitor her son's and activities and schooling. Though she holds a bachelor's degree in business, her heart was leading her to working with underprivileged individuals in a community service setting.

While working with her GLBMW career coach, Terria volunteered as a caregiver and became acquainted with people and programs available in the area. Her dedication and persistence led her to a new role as a shelter advocate for the Hope House, a local homeless shelter. Her supervisors are extremely impressed with her abilities and work ethic.

Parker J. was a student athlete at SVSU with just three semesters left before completing his bachelor's of business administration in accounting. Accustomed to working hard for every dollar to pay for schooling, he found himself facing medical issues disrupting his baseball career and athletic scholarship. A GLBMW career coach worked with Parker help him get paid internships at Knight's Facility Management and Dow – time well spent both financially and professionally. The Dow internship continues through May 2024 while Parker works on his master's degree and completes the four-part CPA exam. He has already accepted a full-time job with the global company starting June 2024 as an associate accounting specialist making nearly double his internship salary.

### Spot-lighting Valued Partners PFLAG and CAN Council

Before the end of this month, nearly all of us will have participated in training with PFLAG Great Lakes Bay.

PFLAG is the first and largest organization dedicated to supporting, educating, and advocating for LGBTQ+ people and their families. Our local chapter was recently recognized nationally for the work they are doing in our region. With this training, we hope to improve as an organization in facilitating conversations, coaching, and creating safe spaces for our LGBTQ+ customers here at Great Lakes Bay Michigan Works!

Another new partner is CAN (Child Abuse and Neglect) Council of Saginaw County. We are excited to work with them on a new venture to deliver their Mobile Family Resource Center – a vehicle that takes high impact services to wherever people are in the region. Our services will center around job search and coaching. We will be hosting the first committee meeting at our Saginaw Service Center this week.

CAN Council was just recently awarded this grant, so we expect the process of "outfitting" the mobile center to take some months before it hits the road. I will keep you updated!

# Health and Nutrition - EFNEP (Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program)

#### In October, I started a partnership and nutrition

education series with the Saginaw Odessey House. 14 participants were enrolled in MSU Extension's Healthy Foods, Healthy Families curriculum. The 6-week series focuses on food budgeting, food safety, label reading and how to increase the amount of fruit and vegetables in your meals. Participants also get an opportunity to taste test a variety of different foods.

I also started four youth classroom series with our continued partnership with Martin Atkins Elementary School. The 4<sup>th</sup> grade classroom will learn more about MyPlate, fruits and vegetables, how to increase their physical activity and make healthier choices through the Show Me Nutrition curriculum. Close to 100 4<sup>th</sup> graders will have the chance to test taste a variety of different foods.

2023 was another exciting year in your Saginaw County Parks. It was the second consecutive season with over 100,000 patrons at William H. Haithco Recreation Area and Imerman Memorial Park between Memorial Day and Labor Day. One hundred thousand people in two parks in fifteen weeks, up from twenty-five thousand patrons a decade ago across that same span. The physical and mental health benefits of being outdoors continue to be prioritized in our community, and we work every day to preserve and expand accessibility to these vital public spaces.

Large-scale capital improvements began at Imerman last summer by replacing the park drive, with more accessibility-based improvements coming later in 2024 including a kayak launch and a renovated boat launch. 2023 also marked the opening of our 7th county-operated park, Saginaw River Headwaters Rec Area, with a formal grand opening coming in summer 2024. 2024 will also see a long-awaited trailhead construction begin along the BayZil Trail in Zilwaukee, along with a series or continued improvements in the other county parks.

While we await another fantastic Michigan summer, I hope you can find the time to enjoy some winter recreation activities and spend time outdoors. Whether it is cross-country skiing on one of our county park system's groomed trails, joining us for a winter hike, skating and sledding

at Hoyt Park, or ice fishing (personal favorite!),

### Community Health Improvement Plan Goes into Motion

Saginaw County Health Department (SCHD) has been leading the BWell Saginaw Partner Coalition through the Community Health Assessment/Community Health Improvement Plan process, lead by Tracy Metcalfe, community health improvement coordinator. The result is a series of 12 strategies with corresponding work groups that are beginning to meet to complete tasks aimed at improving Saginaw County's health outcomes related to obesity & chronic disease, mental health & substance use, and maternal & child health. The plan will be introduced broadly after a press conference on January 23, 2024, 10am-11am at Andersen Enrichment Center. This will be a significant announcement made collaboratively with our BWell Saginaw partners including Ascension St. Mary's, Covenant HealthCare, CMU Medical Education Partners, Great Lakes Bay Health Centers, HealthSource Saginaw, Michigan Departmet of Health & Human Services, MiHIA, Saginaw Community Foundation, Saginaw County Community Mental Health Authority, Saginaw County Intermediate School District, Saginaw Valley State University, United Way of Saginaw County.

SCHD is reorganizing is to fulfill our strategic plan and better align with the Top 3 Health Priorities established within the BWell Saginaw Community Health Improvement Plan. Highlights include a Community Health ResourceProgram, more mobile services, community health navigators, and implicit bias training for health professionals.



### Top 3 Health Priorities – With Equity Lens – Drive SCHD Work

Saginaw's Health Equity Council (HEC), one of 11 throughout the state, has given us vital data to help drive our efforts at tackling Saginaw's Top 3 health priorities. This year, the HEC hosted facilitated listening sessions with the community to help BWell Partners better understand the cultural disconnects that impact inequities in both mental and physical healthcare delivery. Highlights of the HEC's study include the need for more:

- Targeted support for at-risk mothers whose infants are 2.5 times more likely to die before their first birthdays.
- Cultural competency training for healthcare professionals.
- Health literacy to help marginalized populations demystify and navigate the healthcare system.
- Right messages from the right messengers to engage those who are disconnected from or distrusting of healthcare.
- Access to wellness programs and resources.
- Minority healthcare providers.

### **Obesity/Chronic Disease**

Our medical director, Dr. Delicia Pruitt is planning an Obesity Summit on Friday, April 12, 8:30 am – 1 pm at SVSU. The event is primarily designed for healthcare providers to accept and utilize universal standards of care for Saginaw's overweight and obese population. There will be much more to report in the coming months as this innovative event comes together.

In addition, 4 more work obesity-related work groups are being formed to tackle goals specified in the Community Health Improvement Plan.

### Maternal & child health:

To address Saginaw County's high infant mortality rate, we worked with key partners to launch "Parenting Street Smarts – 'The Newbies' Guide to Raising Tiny Bosses" learning series. FB Live events are hosted twice a month on BWell Saginaw's Facebook page. Monthly topics range from safe sleep, infant loss, child development, respiratory concerns, coping with an infant, and swaddling to services available for parents and families.

In October, SCHD officially "sounded the alarm" on safe sleep with a press release and FB live event shared widely by our partners in BWell and beyond. The reason? In the first 8 months of 2023, 10 Saginaw County infants lost their lives due to unsafe sleep practices that were preventable. We are eagerly seeking assistance from the public to spread the word about the importance of infant safe sleep – especially to parents disconnected from traditional support systems and mainstream media messaging.

Here are the guidelines we need people to share:

- BABY SLEEPS ALONE in a SAFE place for every sleep.
- That means preferably a crib, bassinet, or pack 'n play with no pillows, blankets, toys, stuffed animals or bumper pads.

- Resist the temptation no matter how tired you are of feeding or calming your baby and letting them fall asleep with YOU in bed, on the couch, or in a lazyboystyle chair.
- Don't let babies sleep unattended in a car seat.
- Baby and young siblings should not sleep in the same crib.
- Keep baby's sleep space where you can see and hear them. Share your room, not your bed!
- Use a wearable blanket or footed sleeper to keep baby warm. Weighted blankets/sleepers/swaddles should not be used.
- Stop swaddling the baby when they exhibit signs of attempting to roll (typically occurs around 3-4 months, but may occur earlier).
- Remind *everyone* who cares for your baby how to keep baby safe while sleeping.

We need parents, grandparents, friends, neighbors, churches, social service agencies, doctors, first responders, hospitals and the health department – everyone – working together to promote awareness of safer sleep practices so we can help prevent a tragedy for a family.

In the soon-to-be released Community Health Improvement Plan, there are 3 strategies and work groups working to improve materal & child health.







### Mental Health & Substance Use

SCHD launched the "Saginaw Youth Mental Healthopedia" – an online selfhelp resource for adolescents 12 and up. The tool was developed in partnership with Saginaw County high school students who are seeking tools to help understand their feelings about their brains, bodies, and relationships. In addition, the Community Health Improvement Plan calls for four strategies and work groups dedicated to improving Saginaw County's mental health and reduce accidental opioid deaths.

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### SCHD Health Resource Advocates Making K-12 Schools Focal Points for Better Health

Step Up & BWell launched for the school year in October. SCHD health resource advocates (HRAs) are actively working to engage students and staff in more minutes of daily exercise and healthier eating. Currently, a 13 Days of Fitmas challenge – created by HRAs – is available for all of us to participate in! Step Up & BWell results are part of a research initiative in collaboration with CMU College of Medicine.

In addition, SCHD staff are partnering with Pulse3 Foundation to support HeartSafe school certification for our county Schools. Already, Saginaw Arts & Sciences Academy and Swan Valley are HeartSafe school certified – with SASA having a lifesaving win just hours after celebrating the new designation. To help support the costs of this certification, SCHD is supporting the January 27 Shocks and Save hockey game – proceeds of which will fund the HeartSafe Schools programs. The game pits local first responders and healthcare providers against retired NHL hockey players in a pregame exhibition before the regular Saginaw Spirit game.

### Health Promotions & Services Making an Impact

Our free glucose and cholesterol screenings are a hit! SCHD has gone mobile to offer free glucose and cholesterol screening over the past few months. The demand is great, so SCHD staff have 8 more locations planned before the end of the year.



WIC staff continue to work hard to see improvements in various measures including increasing number of women who enroll in WIC within their first trimester of pregnancy. The state goal is 32.9% and Saginaw has enrolled 34.7% of mothers within their first trimester. WIC staff are also doing incredible work to support breastfeeding moms. Watch the BWell Saginaw FB page for more details.

Our Environmental Health Division has been awarded a \$20,000 grant from State EGLE for a watershed protection project to assist Saginaw County Public Works in eliminating human E.coli contamination from a drain in Saginaw Township.

Thanks to SCHD, Saginaw has continued to exceed state rates for vaccination. Since March 31, milestone percentages for Saginaw have continued to grow by an average of 3.5%. While these are countywide rates, SCHD still has a very relevant role in increasing and maintaining these rates. As other counties have seen drastic reductions in childhood immunizations our efforts remain stable and promising!

To keep the momentum going, immunization team has hosted clinics in Merrill/Hemlock, Thomas Township, Maple Grove, and at the Catholic Diocese since mid-October.

### **Other Highlights**

SCHD continues to work with Covenant's EPIC staff to set up an electronic medical records function for SCHD. Federal reporting required for family planning services needs customization which won't be fully available in EPIC until May 2023. SCHD staff worked hard with MDHHS staff to request a waiver on the new reporting requirements – which was granted from the state. This will allow for reprieve as we implement EPIC.

### Guidance for Respiratory Season

We have posted guidance for respiratory season at <u>www.saginawpublichealth.org</u> for individuals/households, businesses, and schools. We encourage everyone to get their seasonal flu and COVID shots. If you don't feel well, here's our mantra for the holiday season:

- He sees you when you're coughing.
- He knows that you might ache.
- He hears you can't stop sneezing.
- So, stay home for goodness sake!
