Hello again from Saginaw H.W. Browne Airport! Spring is in the air and the airplanes are coming out of their winter slumbers.

Fuel prices are up from the last report, with 100 Low Lead fuel at \$5.65 per gallon (self-serve), Jet A fuel at \$5.90 per gallon (self-serve), and \$7.00 per gallon full-serve from the fuel truck. All 40 county hangars remain at 100% capacity.

Spring mosquito control operations are also ramping up. The little yellow planes will be based at the airport for approximately I week while they apply BT mosquito treatment across the county! It takes approximately 8000 gallons of jet fuel to do the Saginaw Mosquito BT application!

The airport is upgrading to an 'air carrier airport' which means more FAA money for airport projects. This is because of increased traffic volumes to our airport, up 88%.

And, happy anniversary to Al Kaufman, airport manager, this year celebrating FIFTY (50) years of service to Saginaw HW Brown Airport.

ATTN: IMPORTANT PROGRAM CHANGES

The State of Michigan will be transitioning to an <u>online application process</u> for SPF coupons. This means Commission on Aging will no longer distribute physical coupon books and/or maintain wait lists for this program. While the changes are not finalized, here is what we do know:

The online application will be available on May 1, 2025

- We do not have an exact website or link for registration, but you can go to the State of Michigan website <u>www.michigan.gov</u> and search for "SENIOR PROJECT FRESH." Information will likely be posted here.
- Individuals will sign up online to receive a QR code or card (like a credit/debit card) that is loaded with \$25 and will be mailed to your address. Coupons can only be used at participating Farmer's Markets.
- Any individual who received SPF coupons in the last (2) two years SHOULD receive a
 postcard in the mail with instructions on how to sign up.
- At this time, we do not know what Farmer's Markets will be participating in the program or how long the application will take to complete. Nutrition Education will be a part of the process.
- The total number of coupon books is allocated by County, but it is first come, first serve.
 We encourage anyone that is able to register on their own to do so as soon as possible on or after May 1.
- Once all coupon books are gone, the online system will ask if you want to sign up to be on the wait list. We encourage doing this, as in previous years, there has been additional funding come in the later part of the year and you may still receive coupons if you sign up.

ELIGIBILITY

- Residents who are aged 60 or older with a total household income of \$28,952.50 or less for an individual, or \$39,127.50 for a couple, are eligible to apply for the program.
- Residents who are aged 55 or older who belong to a Michigan federally recognized tribe or urban tribal group are also eligible.
- Benefits must be obtained in the county in which the applicant lives. The program runs from May 1 to October 31 each year.



Saginaw County Household Scrap Tire Collection to begin May 1st

The Saginaw County Mosquito Abatement Commission (SCMAC) begins its annual Household Scrap Tire Collection Program on Monday, May 1, 2025, running through August 29, 2025. This popular program is available to all Saginaw County residents that meet the criteria below.

In addition to various environmental concerns, scrap tires are ideal mosquito breeding habitat for both nuisance and disease carrying mosquitoes. SCMAC's scrap tire program is part of our mosquito source reduction (habitat elimination) efforts, and annually results in thousands of tires being removed from Saginaw County properties and communities. All collected tires are transported to Environmental Rubber Recycling in Flint where they are shredded and repurposed. This annual effort has removed over 150,000 scrap tires from Saginaw County's environment since 2007.

Scrap tire drop-offs will be accepted at the SCMAC facility located at 705 Towerline Rd, located in Buena Vista Township. Our new facility is just north of Nexteer. Drop-offs are accepted from 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

In addition and for convenience, we will also hold three, Saturday tire drive events from 8:30 AM to 2:30 PM at the location and dates below:

- Rosati's Fresh Market May 17, 2025
 176 S. Hemlock Rd, Hemlock
- St. Charles Middle/High School June 14, 2025
 881 W. Walnut St., St. Charles
- Taymouth Township Hall July 19, 2025
 4343 E. Birch Run Rd., Birch Run July 15, 2023

The program is open to all Saginaw County property owners at no cost and will run through August. All related scrap tire drop-offs must meet the following criteria:

- Saginaw County residents only (Must provide a valid Michigan I.D. or Driver's License)
- Tires are limited to household tires which includes car, pickup truck, motorcycle, bike, or smaller tires.
- Tires must be off the rim.
- Residents limited to 10 tires per address, per year.
- 5. Oversized tires are <u>NOT</u> accepted (NO semi, tractor, or heavy equipment).
- SCMAC does <u>NOT</u> accept tires from businesses or other revenue generating enterprises such as agriculture and contracting operations.

We are again welcoming nearly 50 seasonal technicians, who will be out addressing the upcoming mosquito threat for our 49th year. We are truly grateful for the support, understanding, and participation of the entire Saginaw County community, which is crucial to our continued success.

This season, we look to host an open house welcoming the entire community to visit our new facility, located at 705 N Towerline Rd, just north of Nexteer in Buena Vista Township. While the date for the formal open house is still yet to be finalized, we are open, operating, and offering all services and programming. We look forward to sharing the value of our facility with the community.

ABOUT THIS TRAINING

ASIST is a two-day interactive workshop in suicide first aid. Skills learned in one environment are transferable to others, creating a life-saving impact across the community.

Help is possible when skills, opportunity, and safety are present. When these are available throughout the different facets of someone's life, they're more likely to receive help.

- · Live instruction, audiovisuals, and simulation
- · Trusted by professionals yet learnable by anyone
- · Built-in safety resources and features

Who Should Attend

Anyone can experience thoughts of suicide. By giving participants the skills to help friends, family members, colleagues, and clients stay alive, ASIST supports suicidesafer communities. Although ASIST is widely used by healthcare providers, no formal training is needed to attend the work-shop. Anyone 16 or older can learn and use the model.

Learning Goals & Objectives

Over the course of the two-day workshop, participants will learn to:

- Understand the ways that personal and societal attitudes affect views on suicide and interventions
- Provide guidance and suicide first aid to a person at risk in ways that meet their individual safety needs
- Identify the key elements of an effective suicide safety plan and the actions required to implement it
- Appreciate the value of improving and integrating suicide prevention resources in the community at large
- Recognize other important aspects of suicide prevention including life-promotion and self-care



MRSS launches campaign in Saginaw County

SCCMHA's Mobile Response & Stabilization Services (MRSS) launched a campaign in Saginaw County on April 21, including two billboards highlighting the initiative. The billboards are displayed on M-84 (Bay Rd.) and on I-675, near the Dow Event Center.

In addition, MRSS has a bus ad on one of the STARS buses, and a radio ad being run on Cumulus broadcast stations, WIOG and WHNN. MRSS is a team of mental health professionals trained to assist those in need through a mental health crisis, over the phone, virtually, or inperson.

MRSS is an available service 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and can be reached at (989) 272-0275.

SCCMHA continues to partner with law enforcement for mental health training

SCCMHA also recently hosted two training sessions with several police departments around Saginaw County, looking to work toward a partnership with law enforcement to effectively improve engagement with individuals in mental health crises.

During the sessions – titled "Building a Partnership Between Law Enforcement and Mental Health" – staff from SCCMHA presented to officers from Saginaw County Sheriff's Office, Saginaw City Police, Saginaw Township Police, Carrollton Police, and several other agencies to better inform them of the services provided by SCCMHA that may help law enforcement in dealing with situations having to do with mental health conditions and to help them connect citizens to mental health services as well.

The two four-hour sessions were held on Tuesday, April 8 and Tuesday, April 15 at the VFW Hall at 3265 Kochville Rd. in Saginaw Township. In total, 184 law enforcement officers participated, along with 20 civilians.


