

Spay It Forward

Providing low-cost vet care to those in need

Help SCACC deliver spay/neuter services, microchips, and vaccines to cats and dogs whose owners have been identified by shelter staff as needing assistance. This is a **COMMUNITY SUPPORTED PROGRAM** offering **PREVENTATIVE VETERINARY CARE** before a crisis arises.



Purrfect Pair Cat Sponsor - \$120



Personal Items

To consider before an emergency occurs:

- Family photos consider storing negatives and electronic copies at a location outside your home such as a safe deposit box.
- Valuable jewelry store these items together so they are easy to locate.
- Irreplaceable heirlooms and favorite collectibles can they be moved easily and how much space will they take in your car.
- Take your laptop or disconnect your PC if you're leaving home.

Important Documents To keep secure or take with you:


- Driver's license and passport
- Social Security Card
- Birth, marriage, and death certificates
- Immunization record
- Insurance policies
- Wills, contracts, vehicle titles and property deeds
- One bank statement for each account including credits cards.
- Record of stocks, bonds, or retirement accounts

Tips for success....

- If you live in a flood-prone area, make sure you have adequate flood insurance to reduce your risk of loss.
- Take pictures or make a video of your home possessions for insurance purposes. Include both the interior and exterior of your home.
- To protect your computer, always use unusual passwords, install virus protection and an internal firewall, and regularly backup critical data.
- Store important documents in a waterproof, portable container. Consider using a fire-proof, portable safe deposit box.
- Remember to close and lock your windows and doors and turn off water, gas, and electricity if you must evacuate your home.

WhatsApp with This Phone Number?



In this week's scam, cybercriminals are using phone calls to try to scam you. This type of scam is also known as vishing. You receive a strange call on WhatsApp, a calling and messaging app. The call is from an unknown number, and when you answer, you hear a robotic voice that asks you to add a phone number to your WhatsApp contacts. The call then quickly ends without any further explanation. It seems unusual, but harmless.

However, this is actually a kind of test sent out by cybercriminals. They want to see if you'll listen to their instructions and add the number. If you do, they believe you'll be an easy victim of future scams. They will contact you again and try to trick you into sharing your verification code so they can hijack your account. Once they have control of your account, they may use it for criminal activities or demand money from you before they restore your access. They can even message your WhatsApp contacts and try to scam them, too!

Follow these tips to avoid falling victim to a vishing scam:

- Never add unknown numbers to your contacts, especially if asked to do so unexpectedly.
- Turn on two-step authentication for your account to make it more difficult for cybercriminals to gain access to it.
- Always report and block suspicious phone numbers on your messaging apps. Reporting these numbers also helps protect other users from similar scams.


Finally, we recognize and deeply appreciate the dedication and perseverance of the SCMAC staff, who worked diligently to ensure the project's success.



May primary date would make elections more efficient

s any county clerk will tell you, running elections is a dynamic prospect. The last five years have seen two major ballot initiatives that have turned election administration on its head: one that expanded absentee ballot access to all residents, the other that enabled early voting (among many, many other smaller changes).

And two more ballot initiatives are in the works that would change the way local clerks, county clerks and the Secretary of State's Office run our elections in the near future:

One would require proof of citizenship for each instance that a voter wishes to register or update their registration (think Real ID requirements) and another would enable "Ranked Choice Voting."

A concept you may not yet have read about that would change the way our elections happen in Michigan is by consolidating our August primary election with the May special election date, so that the primary happens in May each year. This would require legislative approval, but it is a real possibility and may take effect as soon as 2026.

The Michigan Association of County Clerks began exploring this option with the Secretary of State's Office and legislators several years ago, for several reasons.

New requirements from Proposal 2 of 2022 now mandate that clerks offer a minimum of nine days of early voting, as well as provide several days after each election for military and overseas ballots to be returned to local clerks (as long as they are postmarked by Election Day) and for voters with signature issues on their absentee ballots to cure those problems.

The added time after the August election specifically makes it extremely difficult to program for the November election while fulfilling the other responsibilities after the August election date (like certifying and

auditing the previous election). Moving the primary election to May gives plenty of time to complete those activities prior to the November election work.

In addition to the practical considerations of meeting new and existing statutory deadlines, it also saves the taxpayers money! Consolidating the primary election means that there will generally be one fewer election for residents to pay for, and the cost savings will primarily be recognized by school districts, cities, and townships who may wish to place items on the ballot in May but may not have a larger jurisdiction do so to pay for it.

The change will also impact attrition for local and county clerks. Presidential years, as they are currently scheduled, are a crucible for local clerks. Nearly all communities had four elections in 2024, and some had as many as six (due to special elections called to fill vacancies). This put massive strain on our local and county clerks, many of whom decided to retire or decided not to run for another term.

It is a tumultuous time to administer election laws, as the playing field is always changing, and may be changing yet again by this time next year. Your local and county clerks are always working hard to ensure we keep delivering safe and secure elections — regardless of how many changes are being thrown at us. •


SCCMHA COMPLETES REMODEL OF COMMUNITY SUPPORT SERVICES OFFICE SUITE AT THE HANCOCK BUILDING

After many years of delay, SCCMHA completed the remodel of the Community Support Services (CSS) suite located on the second floor of the Hancock Building. The office suite is the home to two case management teams serving adults with mental illness.



CSS saw a complete redesign of their space, overhauling the mechanical and electrical systems, updating the HVAC system and heating panels and installing new windows. In addition, the layout of the area has changed, offering more open spaces, new cubicles for staff, and new meeting rooms for the people we serve to help protect their privacy.

The redesign was done to improve workflow, offer more safety and privacy, as well as create a sense of welcoming and openness for both staff and individuals served by SCCMHA.

The project took eight months to complete and was in part financed by the last of the funds available through the County Bond issued on behalf of SCCMHA by Saginaw County. The total cost of the project was \$1.94 million, \$250,000 of which was County Bond funded.

Our thanks to the County of Saginaw for issuing the bonds several years ago for capital projects like this one.

SCCMHA COMPLETES REMODEL OF COMMUNITY SUPPORT SERVICES OFFICE SUITE AT THE HANCOCK BUILDING

In August, SCCMHA will be launching a Community Needs Assessment as a part of our state and federal certification as a Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC), to gain a deeper understanding of behavioral health needs in the community and information to better serve those in Saginaw County.

This survey will cover topics such as insights into the most pressing behavioral health disorders, knowledge about awareness and navigation to care access and treatment, what barriers are being experienced as well as potential improvements in service access, delivery and partnerships.

The survey project will be conducted in the month of August with results compiled in September to guide our strategic planning and for submission to the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services by the end of the fiscal year.



As needs in our community change, it is important to continuously identify those areas where we can assist more people in the community we serve and help facilitate wellness and recovery.

We invite you to take part in this survey to help shape the future of mental health and substance use care in Saginaw County.
