# **SENIOR PROJECT FRESH** ATTN: IMPORTANT PROGRAM CHANGES

The State of Michigan will be transitioning to an <u>online application process</u> for SPF coupons. This means Commission on Aging will no longer distribute physical coupon books and/or maintain wait lists for this program. While the changes are not finalized, here is what we do know:

•The online application launch was delayed will now be available: June 1, 2025

•We do not have an exact website or link for registration, but you can go to the State of Michigan website <u>www.michigan.gov</u> and search for "SENIOR PROJECT FRESH". Information will likely be posted here.

•Individuals will sign up online to receive a QR code or card (like a credit/debit card) that is loaded with \$25 and will be mailed to your address. Coupons can only be used at participating Farmer's Markets.

•Any individual who received SPF coupons in the last (2) two years SHOULD receive a postcard in the mail with instructions on how to sign up.

•At this time, we do not know what Farmer's Markets will be participating in the program or how long the application will take to complete. Nutrition Education will be a part of the process.

•The total number of coupon books is allocated by County, but it is first come, first serve. We encourage anyone that is able to register on their own to do so as soon as possible on or after June 1.

•Once all coupon books are gone, the online system will ask if you want to sign up to be on the wait list. We encourage doing this, as in previous years, there has been additional funding come in the later part of the year and you may still receive coupons if you sign up.



Residents who are aged 60 or older with a total household income of \$28,952.50 or less for an individual, or \$39,127.50 for a couple, are eligible to apply for the program.

Residents who are aged 55 or older who belong to a Michigan federally recognized tribe or urban tribal group are also eligible.

Benefits must be obtained in the county in which the applicant lives. The program runs from June 1 to October 31 each year.



## Go Great Lakes Bay CVB Annette Rummel, Travel Trailblazer (989) 245-1223 County Services Committee

The following provides our latest forecast update for the County of Saginaw and the Great Lakes Bay region. I've included the summary below.

- Room revenue is expected to grow 1.3% in 2025 and 2.2% in 2026.
- Economic conditions support travel growth on an annualized basis.
- US policy is no longer expected to be neutral for the economy in 2025 but will represent a drag due to the accelerated timing of tariffs and the uncertainty associated with them. We expect GDP to grow 2.0% in 2025 following an estimated 2.8% expansion in 2026.

- The North American trade war progressed in a dramatic fashion recently. Though the initial duties announced on March 4 were eventually watered down, tariff rates on US imports from Canada and Mexico are still at double-digit levels.
- Our internal recession models indicate that a looming downturn is unlikely, despite rising recession risks. Household balance sheets are healthy, layoffs remain low, and the economy has weathered more significant shocks in recent years without falling into a recession.
- Trump Administration policies and resulting pronouncements are in a negative sentiment shift toward the US among potential international travelers. We expect negative impact the on international travel to the US to be strongest in 2025, however the expectation is that US citizens will vacation domestically. A potential recession in Canada and Mexico, and a relatively strong US dollar are expected to be headwinds for travel starting this year.

# Advocating for Sustained, Flexible Funding from State Public Health Sub-Committee

Health officer Christina Harrington, MPH, testified before the Michigan House of Representatives Public Health Sub-Committee this month to advocate for sustained, flexible funding to continue local efforts to build the public health infrastructure and to continue driving the BWell Saginaw coalition charged with improving Saginaw's top three health priorities: maternal/child health, obesity/chronic disease, and mental health/substance use. The meeting Harrington attended by invitation from Representative Amos O'Neil — was focused on maternal and child health. She was able to share data about Saginaw's infant mortality rates and address the importance of having the type of funding that allows LOCAL communities to address their specific needs rather than strict "categorized" funding that often goes unspent or has laborious compliance requirements.





# **Room 312 Opens to Offer Community Resources**

The health department has opened Room 312 at its 1600 North Michigan Avenue location for new, walk-in services. Anyone who lives or works in Saginaw County can visit, Monday through Friday, 8am-4:30pm, for FREE. Among its premiere offerings is a body composition scanner – technology that looks a bit like a scale and shows you what your body is made of—not just your weight, but The health department's body composition scanner is one of only a few in Saginaw. It was purchased with grant dollars as a resource to help healthcare providers and the public combat Saginaw County's staggering obesity statistics. Scan results are presented to each person as a printout that can remain confidential or be shared with a physician or trainer.

how much of that weight is muscle, fat, and water. It gives a detailed picture of what's going on inside a body. It can reveal things like: How much fat you have and where it's located (like belly fat).

- How much muscle you have in different parts of your body (like your arms or legs).
- Your bone mass and water levels.

It usually takes just a few minutes and is safe, painless, and helps you track your health and fitness more accurately than a regular scale. The only things you "take off" are your shoes.

- Blood glucose/cholesteral screenings (no fasting required)
- Free COVID tests
- Coupons for free radon test kits and smoke detectors

In this week's scam, you receive an email that appears to be from Coinbase, a platform that allows you to buy, sell, and store cryptocurrency (crypto). The email says that a new wallet address has been set up to make withdrawals from your account. Wallets are tools that are used to manage crypto that you sell or receive. An unexpected email about a new wallet might alarm you, since it might seem like someone is making unauthorized purchases on your account.

The email contains what appears to be a customer support phone number and urges you to call if you do not recognize the new wallet address. However, calling the number won't actually connect you to Coinbase support. Instead, your call will be answered by a scammer who will try to steal your login information. If you give them any personal or login information over the phone, the scammer will use it to take control of your account and crypto wallet!

Follow these tips to avoid falling victim to a phishing scam:


- Never share passwords or login information over the phone. A legitimate organization will never ask you for this information.
- Never contact customer support using the information provided in an email. Always visit an official website to locate an organization's contact information.
- Be wary of any messages urging you to act quickly. These are often phishing scams meant to trick you.

## SCCMHA joins Stand Up for Medicaid town hall at SVSU

SCCMHA CEO Sandra Lindsey was one of several speakers at a town hall hosted by Indivisible and Women of Michigan Action Network (W.O.M.A.N.), held at Saginaw Valley State University.

The town hall – Stand Up for Medicaid – saw over 200 people attend in opposition of the proposed \$880 billion in federal cuts to Medicaid, which would result in Michigan losing \$16 billion in funding over the next 10 years, if passed.

Ms. Lindsey spoke on the seriousness of how these cuts would impact Michigan residents, such as:

- Over 1 million children who receive health coverage through Medicaid.
- 168,000+ seniors who depend on Medicaid for long-term services and supports, including nursing home care and homebased assistance.
- 300,000+ people with disabilities including, mental health conditions and substance use disorders, who use Medicaid to access services that help them live and work in their communities.
- 740,000+ low-income adults and working families depend on Medicaid to cover the cost of basic health care needs through the Healthy MI Program.

Also speaking at the event were Catherine Macomber with the SVSU College of Social Work, SVSU social work student Laurel Hammis, Allison Wilcox of W.O.M.A.N., and Jean Irwin, a local resident, who is also a caretaker/guardian of someone served by Medicaid.

Speakers encouraged the public to contact their legislators to oppose these federal cuts to Medicaid.

## Saginaw County and City of Saginaw issue proclamations for Mental Health Awareness Month

Persons served by SCCMHA were in attendance at the monthly meetings for both the Saginaw City Council and the Saginaw County Board of Commissioners, as they recognized May as Mental Health Awareness Month.

The Saginaw City Council meeting, held on Monday, May 5, issued their proclamation to start the meeting, as members of the Bayside Lodge Clubhouse and members of the Consumer Leadership Group were there to receive the proclamation.

Saginaw County's Board of Commissioners issued their observance of the holiday on Tuesday, May 20. Mental Health Awareness Month is recognized in May as a time to raise awareness and reduce the stigma around behavioral health issues and how it can impact all of us, whether personally or through our friends and families.

## Saginaw County 911: Steadfast in the Storm

When extreme weather swept across Saginaw County during the early hours of May 16, Central Dispatch stood at the forefront of the emergency response effort. Dispatchers managed over 130 emergency calls during a two-hour time frame. This is a clear testament to their resilience and professionalism under pressure.

From downed power lines and roadway hazards to fire alarms and urgent medical calls, emergency services across the county were dispatched in rapid succession, and through it all, Central Dispatch ensured that communication remained clear, timely, and accurate.


